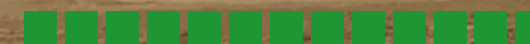

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FOREWORD

In a year where the events in the Middle East and the escalation of violence in Ukraine brought violent conflict very close to home, PATRIR as one of the few civil society peacebuilding institutions in Eastern Europe paid close attention to these dynamics and continued its efforts to conduct in-depth multi-partial analysis, to seek to support peace intelligence through its capacity building programmes and to focus, perhaps more than before on weaving at the national level in Romania a systemic base for non-violence.

Our focus in 2014 was multi-fold:

- We continued our international training programmes both in Cluj Napoca and internationally focusing on Early Warning Early Response, Designing Peace Programmes, Training of Trainers and Facilitators
- We continued through projects and consultancies to engage together with local partners in peacebuilding activities in Afghanistan, Ukraine, Nepal, Mexico, Lebanon and others.
- We focused on developing a systemic analysis of the causes and effects of violence in schools and also on creating alternatives through peace education and peer mediation.

We sought, following our Strategic Plan, to increase the awareness, trust, capability and quality of conflict transformation and peacebuilding among civil society primarily but also among the general public and key decision makers. We did that through thorough research (such as in the case of the Afghanistan project and violence in schools project), through collaborative training and design (especially in the consultancies, training programmes and exchanges), through bold and documented input and presentations in conferences and public appearances and through improved evaluation and monitoring of existing programmes. For us, at PATRIR this is the cycle of peacebuilding quality that needs to exist in any programming, and it is the cycle described in the very name of our institute.

This Annual Report will guide the reader through the efforts for peace that all our team has undergone in 2014, from different angles, with different tools and on different levels. We treasure the fact that we bring the topic of peacebuilding into our society at all levels, from policy discussions to work in some of the most disadvantaged areas and back to policy discussions. We are inspired by all these environments and thankful to our supporters, either visionary individuals or large institutions. We encourage you to pay attention to our hopes for 2015 and for the years to come hoping that the future will also mean our crossing paths with you and other inspiring people working for peace in the world!

ABOUT PATRIR

Over the last 13 years, the Peace, Action, Training and Research Institute of Romania (PATRIR) has become a renowned center supporting practitioners and experts in the field of peacebuilding, capacity building and conflict transformation. PATRIR works mainly through its three departmental pillars described below:

The Department of Peace Operations (DPO) works upon request from conflict parties and local, national and international organizations and agencies to support violence prevention, peacebuilding, mediation and post-war recovery. The mission of the DPO is to strengthen capacities and infrastructures for peace operations, to gather best-practices and lessons-learned, to improve the quality and effectiveness of peacebuilding programmes in conflict affected countries and support on-going mediation and peace processes. DPO experts include practitioners, analysts, diplomats and current and former military. Its global roster provides on-call available practitioners and civilian experts whose work is to support local, national and international peacebuilding and peace engagements. DPO also provides extended consultations and organizational & policy development support for governments, national and international organizations to improve their effectiveness and impact for peacebuilding and conflict transformation.

The International Peace and Development Training Center (IPDTC) was established in 2003 as one of the main centers of PATRIR. The role assigned to it is to pioneer and develop training & capacity building programmes for those working in conflict affected, war and post-war environments. IPDTC works towards the vision of improved quality, impact and effectiveness of peacebuilding, conflict transformation, violence prevention and post-war recovery, where individuals, communities and organizations are empowered with skills, tools, knowledge and commitment to address conflicts constructively through peaceful and effective means. Thus, IPDTC holds the mission to provide high-quality practical skills and knowledge-based training programmes for conflict party leadership, government and decision makers, practitioners and those working with conflicts in the field.

The Department for Education for Peace and Development (DEPD) was formed in 2010 from the initial Youth Peacebuilding Center. The mission of DEPD is to work for a world in which people share the belief that their attitudes and behaviours are decisive in resolving conflicts and waging peace, a world in which they can and do act upon that belief. The major programme lines of DEPD are (i) participatory democracy and civic engagement, (ii) development education and awareness raising and (iii) promotion of multiculturalism and combatting discrimination.

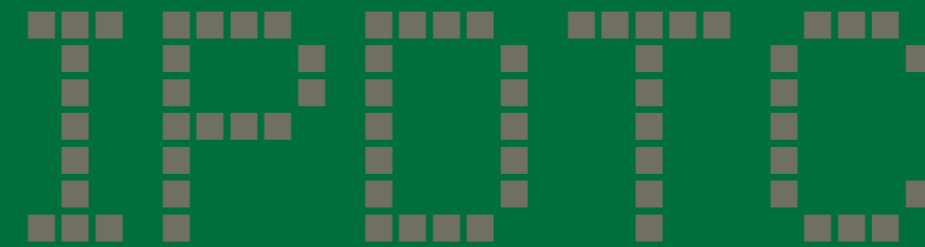

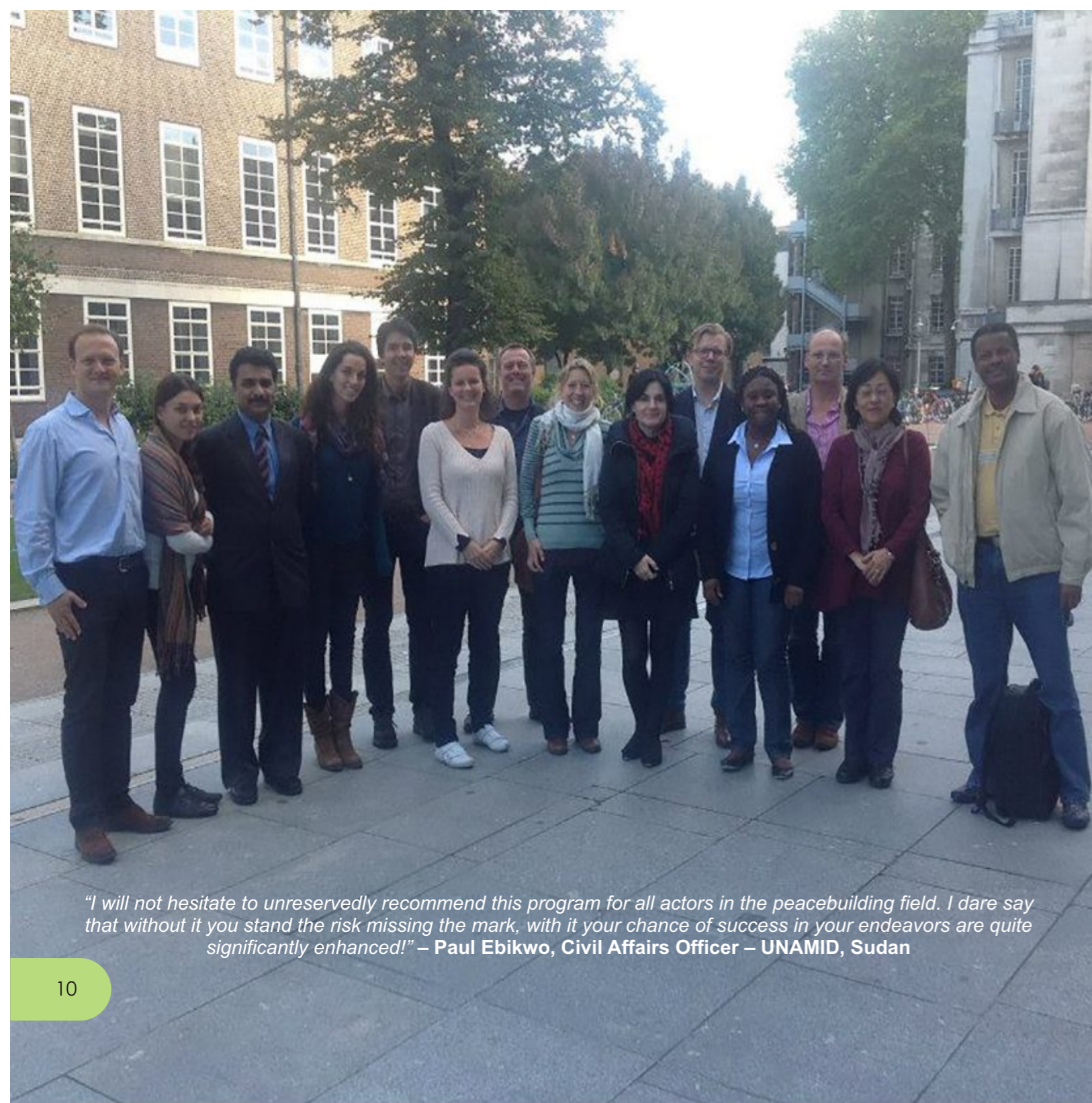
International Peace and Development Training Center

In 2014 IPDTC has continued its flagship training programmes and in parallel has consolidated its engagement on-the ground, working with partners in Afghanistan to conduct a participatory assessment of capacity building needs and results of the past training efforts.

The Project "Achieving the MDGs through Peacebuilding: Capacity building in transition to democracy, community based-dialogue and peacekeeping operations for international, national and local actors in Afghanistan" that started in 2012, implemented in partnership with the Kabul-based Cooperation for Peace and Unity (CPAU) ended successfully with the publication of the Strategic Handbook Peace Consolidation Strategy Building: From Analysis to Approach Selection aiming at identifying peacebuilding and peacemaking capacity building needs, achievements and lessons learned of local, national and international actors working in Afghanistan, and also containing policy recommendations and demand-based capacity building programmes aiding a peaceful transition and sustainable MDG achievement. The project was financed by the Romanian Ministry of Foreign Affairs through the Official Development Assistance instrument and the UNDP - Regional Center for Europe and CIS.

The activities and research of the Center are due to a dedicated team of staff, associates, interns and volunteers, each focusing on designated strategic activity areas: training coordination, fundraising and research.

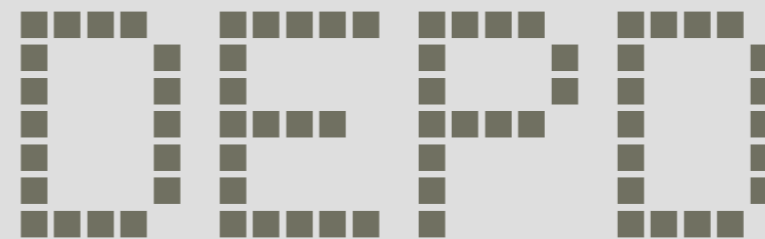

Department for Education for Peace and Development

DEPD continued the collaboration and engagement with local institutions in terms of strengthening the capacities to work on issues such as preventing school violence, peer mediation, encouraging horizontal lines of communication between local institutions regarding policies management. Moreover, we offered a space for youth to learn of new ways of improving community life and create their own future.

During the first half of 2014, we've received a 22 month grant from the EEA Grants 2009-2014 and we began implementing the project 'Participation in Decision Making: Improvement of local policies on prevention and combating of school violence'. This is the result of the work done in a bilateral partnership meeting that was hosted by the Norwegian Peace Council in Oslo back in June 2013.

Internationally, we continued our collaboration with the Netherlands, Norway, Northern Ireland, Slovakia, Poland, the Czech Republic, Serbia, and Spain countries in which we have good friends and partners working mainly on youth and peacebuilding. With them we keep preparing generations of peacebuilders, equipping them with tools and skills that should be then transferred in their societies for a more peaceful world.

All our work would not be possible without the dedication of our staff members and the support of our interns and volunteers. Their contribution, dedication and commitment are highly appreciated, and are proof that civil society organizations can provide a solid and relevant work experience to students or newly graduates.

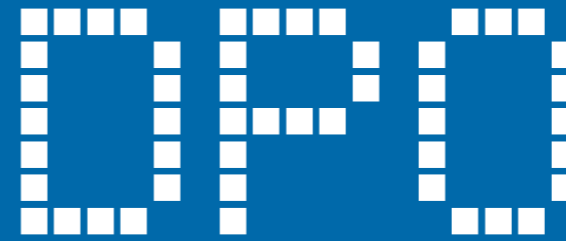
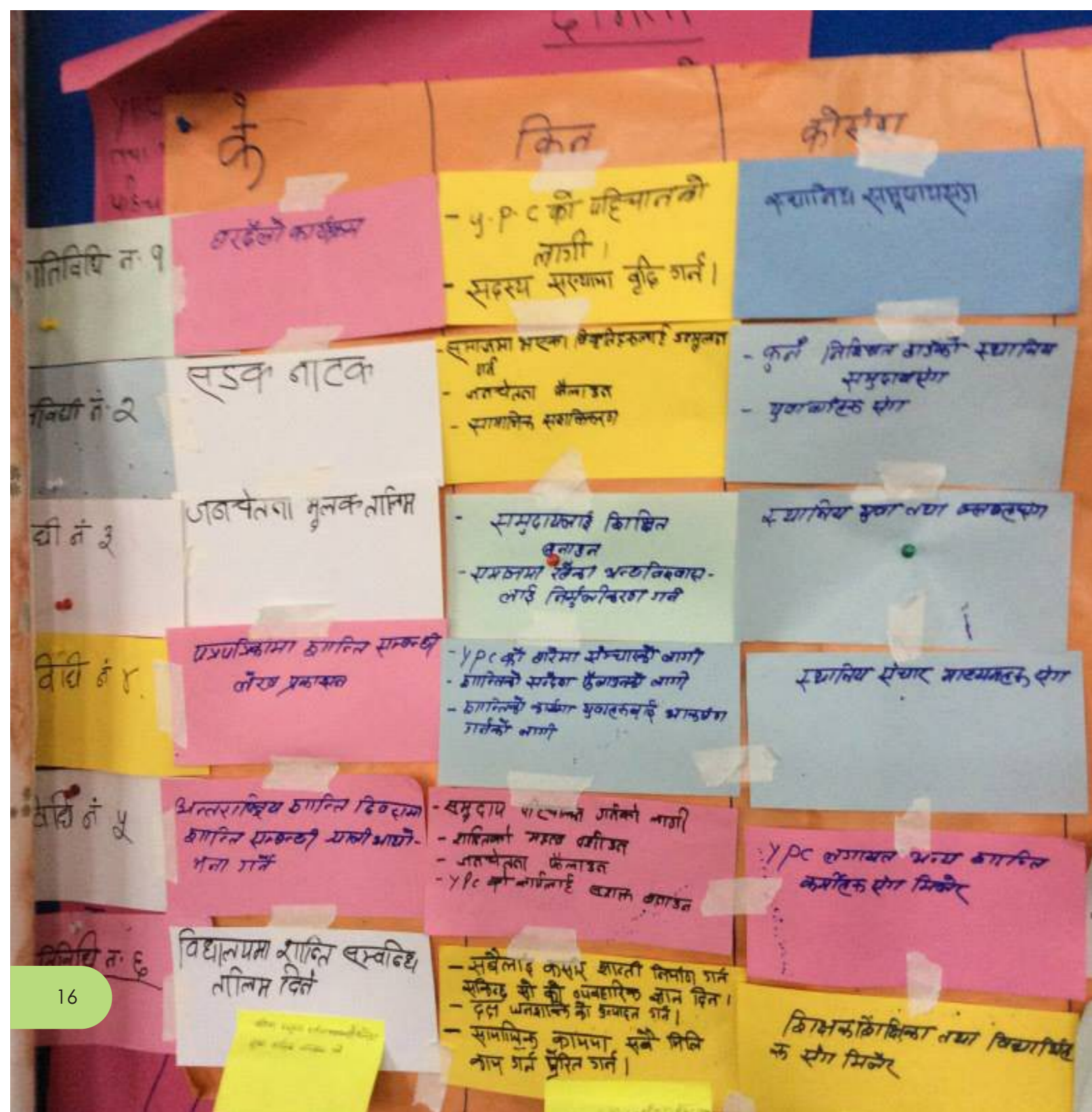
ACHIEVEMENTS AND IMPACT

28 workshops with around 400 students offered tools of dealing with school violence in a non-violent manner, 24 students and 12 teachers trained in peer-mediation, 25 youth workers with various professional backgrounds engaged in PDRVS, 50 participants at our workshops on relationship management and negotiation were offered insight into conflict transformation, NVC, as well as practical tools for addressing conflicts.

GOALS FOR 2015 AND FUTURE STRATEGIES

- We will work to continue and strengthen the collaboration with the Cluj County School Inspectorate and a large number of schools in Cluj Napoca. We would also like to double the number of classes we work with.
- We will engage more in public consultations in the project starting with the Cluj County School Inspectorate, we will be more visible through the public campaigns for promoting nonviolence, we will have a second training course with the members of the action group on the topic of Advocacy and we will establish the methodology and desired indicators and design the field work instruments (surveys, questionnaires, focus groups etc.)

2014 in Review: Building Capabilities and Infrastructure for Peace (I4P)

2014 was in many ways a year focusing on building capabilities and infrastructure for peace. The Department developed further its programmes of cooperation and collaboration with universities, providing trainings, guidance and support to programmes at Oxford University (UK), University of Florence (Italy) and Hacettepe University (Turkey) to develop their graduate studies programmes in the field. This is part of DPO's ongoing engagement to strengthen and develop graduate studies programmes as well as training at staff colleges, diplomatic academies, and government and civil training institutions to improve professional development and preparation of practitioners for peacebuilding. Central to this is strengthening the connection between applied / professional peacebuilding practice in the field with training practitioners and those engaging in peacebuilding with key expertise, skills, tools and learning from experience on the ground.

2014 also saw the completion of the Department's multi-year engagement to support development of community-based peacebuilding infrastructure and Youth Peace Centers in Nepal in partnership with GIZ. This programme engaged community development workers, ex-combatants, community-based organization and youth in developing targeted, practical community participation in the peace process.

With the outbreak of the war in Palestine-Israel the Department played an active role supporting peacebuilding practitioners across both communities and mobilizing international engagement to bring an end to the violence and strengthen support for an authentic, legitimate peace process to meet the needs for peace, freedom and security for all Palestinians and Israelis.

2014 was also a signal year marking the 30th Anniversary of the Brighton Bombing during the Northern Ireland conflict. DPO Director Kai Brand-Jacobsen was invited to Brighton to facilitate a unique event marking the anniversary by bringing together Patrick Magee, the man who carried out the Brighton Bombing, and Jo Berry, daughter of Hon. Sir Anthony Berry who was tragically killed in the bombing.

The programme also included extraordinary survivors and former members of groups using extreme violence from the United States, Rwanda, UK, Norway and elsewhere, and marked a deepening of PATRIR-DPO's engagement, collaboration and partnership with Building Bridges UK, an organization dedicated to helping survivors and formers reach out together across the chasm of painful experience and often hatred and violence, and find courage and strength to build futures beyond war and hate. This led in the last half of 2014 to the development and launch of a global partnership / alliance working to overcome / transcend violent extremism and radicalization and to support i. authentic, citizen-based peacebuilding in countries affected by armed conflict in the Middle East and North Africa; and ii. changing and improving government policies and measures – of governments in the region and internationally – to prevent/stop war escalation and violence intensification measures and replace them with proven and effective strategies and approaches to reduce and prevent violence and radicalization.

In the Autumn of 2014 DPO was invited by SETA in Ankara to provide a briefing and review on Turkey's role and engagement in regional conflicts in the Middle East and North Africa, and how to transform this to an effective role to reduce violence and radicalization in the region. This was followed by a consultation meeting with the Presidents' Office, the Advisor to the President and negotiators for the Government of Turkey to identify, recognize and benefit from the historic opportunities of achieving a real, lasting and authentic peace in the Turkish – Kurdish peace process.

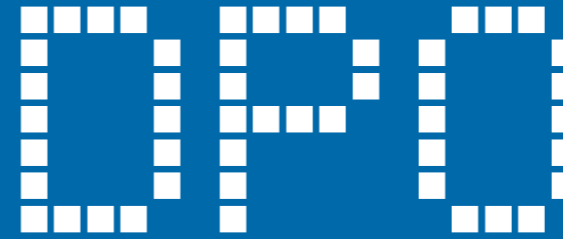
2014 was also a milestone and significant year with the launch by the International Association of Human Values (IAHV) of their Peacebuilding Unit. DPO was requested to assist IAHV Peacebuilding in the customization and development of their contribution and engagement in peacebuilding – bringing a much needed focus on inner peace and addressing the human dimension and experience of conflict and peace, so often left out and neglected. This included a 5-day capacity building, strategic planning and organizational development programme for IAHV Peacebuilding practitioners from around the world held in Germany.

Work on the PAX strategic planning handbook and toolkit for peacebuilding was carried out throughout the year with completion planned for the first part of 2015. In late 2014 planning began with PAX, Peaceful Change International and Un Ponte Per (UPP) for requested programmes for Libya and Iraq to be implemented in 2015.

Throughout the year DPO Director worked together with ReFrame Films, currently producing a documentary on peacebuilding. ReFrame films travelled with the Director of DPO, Kai Brand-Jacobsen to Nepal in 2013, Turkey in 2014, and will take part in engagements in Iraq to support development of an Iraqi Citizens' Peace Movement / Peace Process in 2015. The documentary is then planned for launch in early 2016.

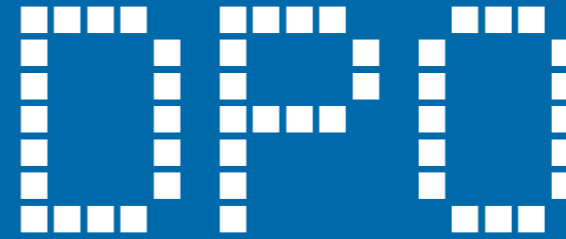

CRIMEA POLICY DIALOGUE PROJECT

The CPD project, supported financially by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Finland, as part of its Wider Europe Initiative sustained thematic dialogue processes on language policy, land policy and identity policy and provided an opportunity to study the experience of policy work with conflict situations in other parts of Europe. It operated from 2009. A long-term dialogue and research platform was created within the framework of the project, where inputs were made not only by political and national groups of Crimea but also by influential experts from Kyiv, European Union, Russia and Turkey. The project included the opportunity for regular exchange of expert opinions and joint strategic analysis of conflict-related factors at the intra-Crimean and Ukrainian levels.

Following the escalation of political upheaval and violence in Ukraine and instability in Crimea, the CPD team conducted an assessment of the situation in order to envision possibilities for the project in 2014. Given the annexation of Crimea in spring 2014 the activities foreseen needed to be substantially changed due to security and trust factors. This is why in 2014 the CPD activities consisted of a scoping mission to Crimea to assess the situation and possibilities for continued dialogue, local meetings of dialogue group members and completion of research including "Past, Present and Future of the Crimean Tatars in the Discourse of the Major Islamic Groups of the Crimean Peninsula", "Attitude of Crimeans to the Problems and Prospects of the Peninsula's Demilitarization", "Case Studies of Crimean Humanitarian Issues" and "Mapping Emigration from Crimea."

One specific area of increased engagement was in the sphere of education as a long term prevention measure. Upon request from the Ukrainian Ministry of Education and Science PATRIR continued its work on multilingual education started within the framework of the CPD project and designed a process of consultation and piloting for a multilingual education project in 3 regions of mainland Ukraine. An initial consultation was held in July 2014 in Kyiv by PATRIR and Ukrainian CPD experts specialising in multilingual education, with several representatives of the Ministry of Education and Science of Ukraine and experts from the National Academy of Pedagogy of Ukraine in charge of drafting curricula, following which an action plan for the period 2014- 2015

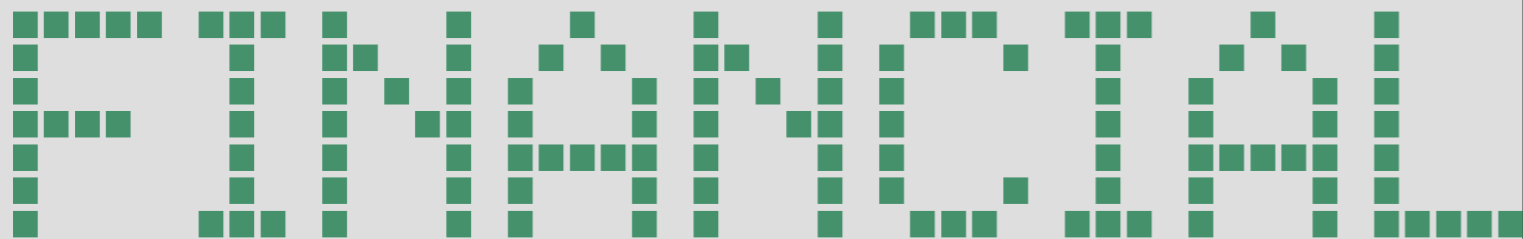
was developed with the ambition to start piloting by 2016 a multilingual education programme in mainland Ukraine. In 2014 we have produced a research package on multilingual education to be given as a background documentation in subsequent events and workshops. This included all relevant materials produced previously on the subject in the CPD project and additional policy and methodological materials for developing multilingual education model(s) at the national level in Ukraine.

The three major objectives of this programme include the following:

- ENSURE through multi-lingual education modern and high quality instruction in the schools selected
- DEVELOP inter-community understanding, interactions and interdependence
- IMPROVE social cohesion and prevent tensions

For 2015 further regional consultations, capacity building and tailored support to piloting educational programmes are planned, representing one of the very significant engagements of PATRIR with potential for utility in other multi-ethnic, multi-lingual regions.



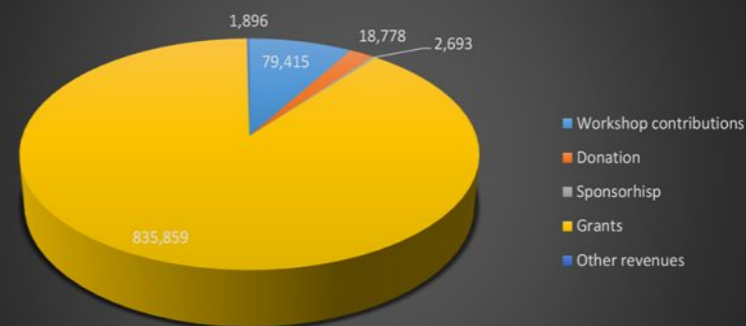

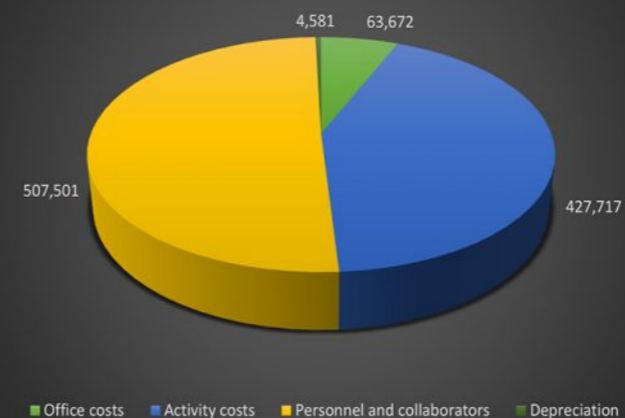

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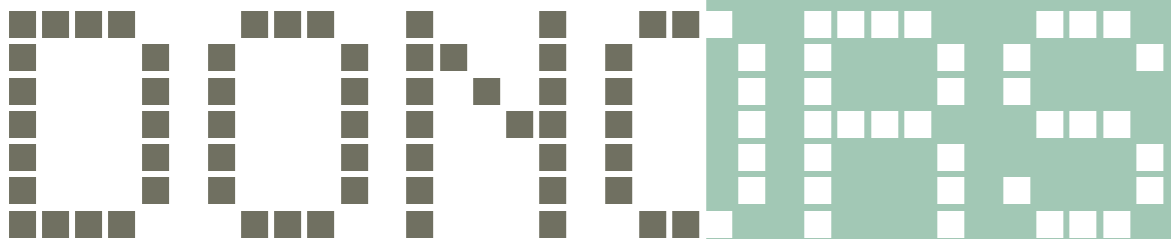
