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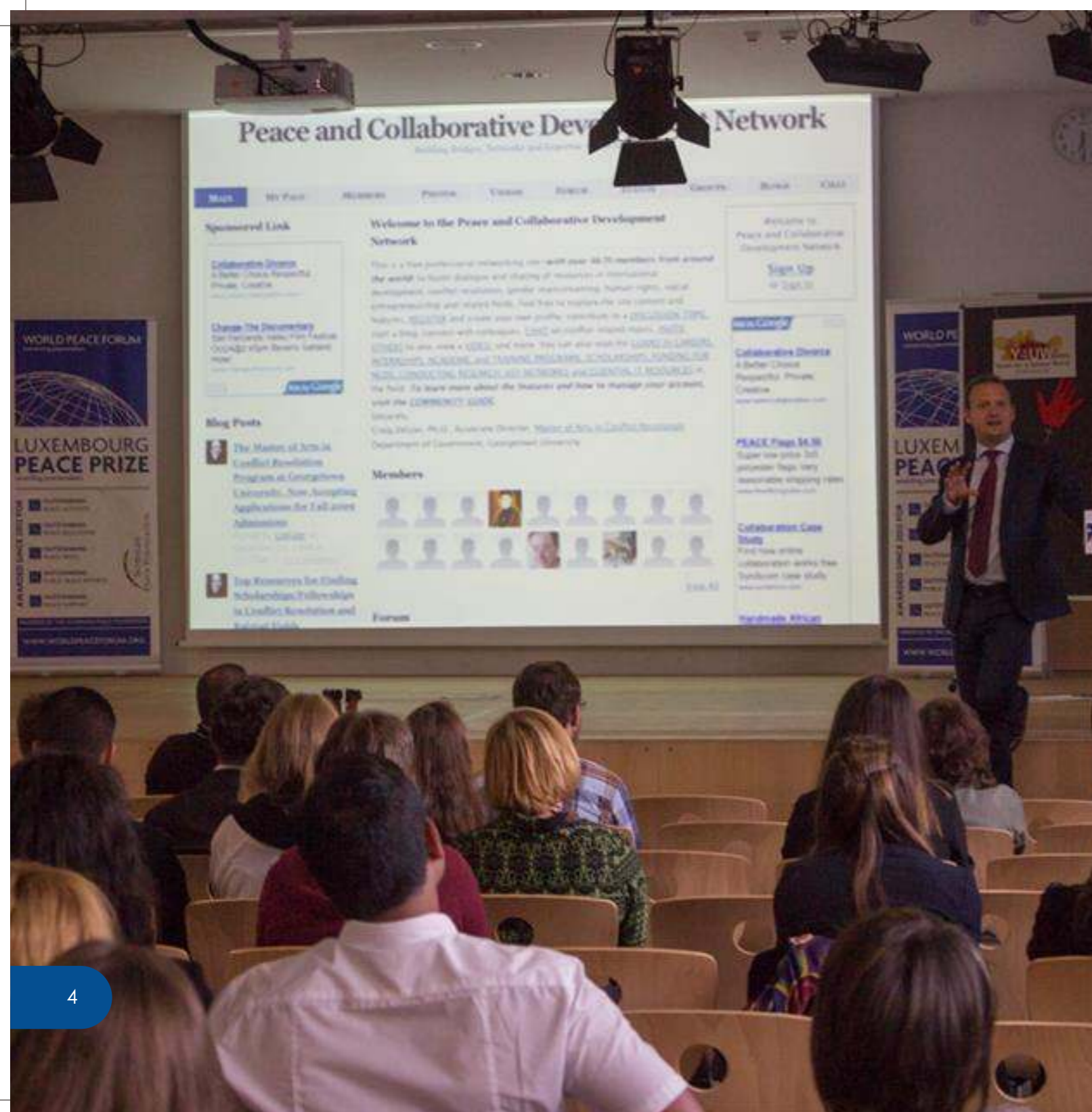


FOREWORD

ABOUT PATRIR

Over the last 14 years, the Peace Action, Training and Research Institute of Romania (PATRIR) has become a renowned center supporting practitioners and experts in the field of peacebuilding, capacity building and conflict transformation. PATRIR works mainly through its three departmental pillars described below:

The Department of Peace Operations (DPO) works upon request from conflict parties and local, national and international organizations and agencies to support violence prevention, peacebuilding, mediation and post-war recovery. The mission of the DPO is to strengthen capacities and infrastructures for peace operations, to gather best-practices and lessons-learnt, to improve the quality and effectiveness of peacebuilding programmes in conflict affected countries and support on-going mediation and peace processes. DPO experts include practitioners, analysts, diplomats and current and former military. Its global roster provides on-call available practitioners and civilian experts whose work is to support local, national and international peacebuilding and peace engagements. DPO also provides extended consultations and organizational & policy development support for governments, national and international organizations to improve their effectiveness and impact for peacebuilding and conflict transformation.

The International Peace and Development Training Center (IPDTC) was established in 2003 as one of the main centers of PATRIR. The role assigned to it is to pioneer and develop training & capacity building programmes for those working in conflict affected, war and post-war environments. IPDTC works towards the vision of improved quality, impact and effectiveness of peacebuilding, conflict transformation, violence prevention and post-war recovery, where individuals, communities and organizations are empowered with skills, tools, knowledge and commitment to address conflicts constructively through peaceful and effective means. Thus, IPDTC holds the mission to provide high-quality practical skills and knowledge-based training programmes for conflict party leadership, government and decision makers, practitioners and those working with conflicts in the field.

The Department for Education for Peace and Development (DEPD) was formed in 2010 from the initial Youth Peacebuilding Center. The mission of DEPD is to work for a world in which people share the belief that their attitudes and behaviours are decisive in resolving conflicts and waging peace, a world in which they can and do act upon that belief. The major programme lines of DEPD are (i) participatory democracy and civic engagement, (ii) development education and awareness raising and (iii) promotion of multiculturalism and combatting discrimination.



INTERNATIONAL PEACE AND DEVELOPMENT TRAINING CENTER

Building an alliance of organizations, academics and professionals for a non-violent system of policies in Romania

I4P Romania - Establishing the Network Infrastructure for Peace Romania program, aimed in a first phase at building capacity in terms of conflict analysis, restorative practices and design interventions in conflict transformation. Secondly, it was developed to fortify the capacity of NGOs to approach and to deal with different types of conflicts and to advocate for including restorative practices and elements of conflict transformation in the existing public policies.

The ultimate goal of this project was to create a network of 15 organizations which will be working in partnership with authorities in the field of dialogue, reconciliation, mediation and conflict transformation establishing the Romanian infrastructure for peace.

In support of this action several trainings as well as course handbooks were delivered to a variety of participants from all over the country, from rural and urban areas, with different backgrounds and occupation, representing different ethnic groups and nationalities.

I4P at a glance

- Complex Conflict Analysis training delivered in Cluj-Napoca
- Reconciliation through Restorative Practices training delivered in Bucharest
- Workshop on Identity Conflicts held in Bucharest
- Approx. 100 participants from mediators, social workers, NGO members, bloggers, researchers, to psychologists, pre-university and university teachers and students attended the events, increasing the capacity of the civil society through training with the purpose of understanding, analyzing and approaching identity conflicts, discussing examples of good practice worldwide and adapting ideas to the Romanian context

Improving the local prevention policy on school violence

The project on Participation in Decision making – Reduction of Violence in Schools led to a better understanding of the root causes and existing forms of violence in schools for the participants in this program

To ensure the success of this program but also the needed support, we aimed at involving in this process multiple stakeholders such as teachers, pupils, student councilors, therapists, parents and representatives of Cluj County School Inspectorate and Cluj County Police.

PDRVS at a glance

- 5 public consultations held with participants from concerned categories or institutions: teachers, students, parents and representatives from Cluj School Inspectorate
- Conducted a comparative research resulting in the study “Understanding and addressing school violence – Comparative research Serbia, Norway and Romania” which was presented to students and teachers in a 2-day conference in Cluj-Napoca
- 2 training courses delivered to the members of our action group on advocacy and policy making
- 4 nonviolence campaigns in schools from Cluj-Napoca with the participation of more than 800 students and teachers
- Provided recommendations to Cluj County School Inspectorate for improving policy for prevention of violence to the in order to be included in their policy for violence prevention for the school year 2016/2017



Prevent and reduce violence and social exclusion in disadvantaged communities. Piloting adapted educational practices

EduPeace Club is a non-formal space, opened in partnership with Nicolae Iorga Middle School, where children enrolled in the 5th up to 8th grade improve their communication skills, networking and civic responsibility. The beneficiaries are coming from poor environments and they are at high risk of school dropout, absenteeism and therefore of being marginalized or socially excluded.

EduPeace Club at a glance

- Trainings delivered to both teachers and volunteers in order to have them prepared on alternative education methods, focusing on mediation and nonviolence in schools
- Researches following the changes in behavior and abilities of the beneficiaries, as well as designing an efficient methodology in preventing social exclusion
- Job-Shadowing Days and two Friendly Football Matches which placed the beneficiaries from the Club in the bigger community of students that share similar perspectives, but not the same social issues, helping the students in this program to raise their self-esteem and to create a stronger connection inside the group

Raising awareness on the presence and the consequences of online Hate Speech

Switch OFF/ONline Hate Speech is a PATRIR initiative that joins the efforts the international No Hate Speech Movement, a youth campaign of the Council of Europe. Through this project we've mobilized Romanian journalists and bloggers into raising awareness for internet users in Romania about the presence and consequences of online Hate Speech.

PATRIR aims at raising the awareness of 10 most followed Romanian bloggers as well as 10 journalists, who, as opinion shapers (the target group), have deepened their understanding of the consequences of hate speech. At the same time, they have been trained on building their capacity to deal with and transform hate speech in the Romanian online space, promoting respect and non-violence.

Switch OFF/ONline Hate Speech at a glance

- Established the action group and offered its members training courses on the topics of: empathic communication, conflict transformation, human rights and intercultural dialogue
- Launched the first study on the situation of online Hate Speech in Romania, study which analyzed over 2.6 million comments in Romanian posted between January-June on most popular Facebook pages from Romania, top blogs and most visible news platforms with the study results being presented in a public conference in Cluj-Napoca
- Reached over 500.000 internet users with the materials created in the project campaign, which also included popular short videos called No Hate Speech Debate, hosted by famous Romanian actor and comedian Bogdan Bob Radulescu



Considering the diversity of peace building initiatives in formal and non-formal education

With the Peace and Development in the European Education (Grundtvig) project we have created a sharing space for tools and methods in an easily-accessible format that enables growth and also discussion around each of the tools. We have been able to consider and highlight the highly complex and nuanced reasons why the transferability of resources can both provide access to existing resource bases and stimulation for the creation of new context-specific tools and methodologies.

Grundtvig at a glance

- Creation of a YouTube channel to better understand and evidence the local context in which peace building work occurs
- Research materials describing the peace and development education contexts in each of the partner countries, the exposure and increased skills of the people taking part in the mobilities and most importantly a set of videos on different aspects of peace education

Strengthening organizational capacities in the areas of Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning (MEL)

The Youth Impact is an organizational capacity development project implemented by the United Network of Young Peacebuilders in partnership with five of its European members, including PATRIR. The over-all objective of the project is to foster quality improvements in youth work in general and youth peace education in particular and to promote young people's active citizenship at European level, in accordance to the EU Youth Strategy 2010 – 2018.

During the project, a research team carried out organizational assessments of all the partners in order to create action plans for implementing stronger MEL processes. The assessments were used to create a Research Report on Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning in six European youth organizations. On the basis of the research report, the organizational assessments, PATRIR has created an action plans for improving and consolidating its MEL processes. By the end of the project the team will have developed a toolkit which will offer guidance and specific assessment tools for youth workers, in the peacebuilding field, to be able to better plan, monitor and evaluate their work and learn from it.

Youth Impact at a glance

- Development of a general MEL organizational self-assessment tool
- Completion of a self-assessment questionnaire in each participating organization and a skill assessment survey among organization's personnel
- 6 on-site research visits to all partner organizations for analyzing organizational documentation and participating in focus group discussions and exercises
- Increased quality in youth work carried out by youth-led organizations across Europe, through stronger MEL processes which enable the organizations to take a more strategic approach to their non-formal education activities



Helping students to choose their dream job

For the 3rd year in a row, through Relay Day initiative, PATRIR has offered gymnasium and high-school students in Cluj-Napoca the chance to get to know the jobs that they would like to have in the future.

Relay Day at a glance

- 76 students from schools based in Cluj-Napoca had the chance to spend one day in the work place where they see themselves in the future
- Students met and discussed with professionals working in the domains they would also like to develop their career, to better understand how to prepare themselves for the future

Challenging youth for education, raising awareness and personal development

The Say it, Play it, Think it Forward: The Blueprint of a Movement initiative was one of PATRIR's efforts of awareness raising regarding the need and the practical utility of peace and development work as well as the efforts to come up with practical tools for peace and development education in Cluj-Napoca community. The challenges included interviews, board game development, public campaigns and flash mobs, advocacy activities and engaging with decision making factors, and many others. The participating challengers had the opportunity to be coached by experts in the field of PR, communication, advocacy, etc., and also to receive guidance and accompaniment from a team of mentors.

Forward Challenge at a glance

- 11 Organisational Challengers involved, representing 9 organisations or institutions from Cluj-Napoca
- 100+ young challengers registered in 27 teams
- Increased level of awareness about Sustainable Development Goals in the sense of team work and communication

DEPARTMENT OF PEACE OPERATIONS

Months of Intensive peacebuilding

As violence and sectarian extremism have increased across the Middle East and North Africa so has the Department of Peace Operations' (DPO) engagement to address these. In cooperation with key organizations addressing violent extremism DPO launched the development of a global alliance on Beyond Violent Extremism focusing on: increasing research and evidence-gathering on the impact of policies and approaches, gathering best-practice lessons, strengthening on the ground programming and support for prevention and peacebuilding, and empowering effective citizen and government engagement. This has been complemented by on-the-ground country programmes in Iraq, development of the Libya country engagement, and, in partnership with IAHV Peacebuilding, a substantial new Lebanon country engagement. In all DPO focuses on improving, strengthening and supporting local and nationally owned processes and capabilities for peacebuilding and prevention and supporting the improvement of joined-up, strategic peacebuilding across government, NGO, UN and other sectors. The first 6 months of 2015 also saw the completion of the Strategic Peacebuilding Guide & Toolkit for PAX, a major development in the field to bring together key tools to assist organizations / agencies in designing effective, tested programming to achieve impact and bring about meaningful change in conflict situations. At the World Peace Forum, in Oslo in cooperation with Norwegian Peace House, and in Bahrain at the invitation of Rotary International and His Royal Highness Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa, Crown Prince of Bahrain, the Department continued its engagement to raise understanding of citizens, policy makers and key interest groups on the economic costs of war and armed violence and the benefits of peace, and practical options and strategies for improving peacebuilding effectiveness. Throughout the entire period of 2015 through to June DPO has also focused on providing support for IAHV Peacebuilding's developing engagement to improve psycho-social support and trauma healing, recovery, and strengthening resilience, balance and inner peace for affected populations and aid, development and peace workers.

In October Kai Brand-Jacobsen, Director of the Department of Peace Operations (DPO) was asked both to speak at the World Peace Forum Prize Ceremony in Luxembourg and to facilitate a 1-day assisted strategic planning process with the Board of the WPF. The strategic planning process was done to assist the WPF in developing as an organisation to play a leading role as a linker and connector of peacebuilders across the global and to position the WPF to be able to address issues at the frontiers of peacebuilding and dealing with conflicts effectively.

Kai also took part in a panel with leading experts on addressing the current situation in which millions of human beings are being displaced from their homes in Iraq and Syria and forced to risk their lives in dangerous transit across the Mediterranean. His closing speech at the WPF provided a global overview of peacebuilding and conflicts in the world today and was heralded by one participant as "the most inspiring speech I've heard in my lifetime." PATRIR will continue its relationships with the World Peace Forum and work to actively support the Forum's development as a major global fora for peacebuilders and the peacebuilding community.

The UN-sponsored Nineveh Paths to Peace programme implemented in cooperation with Un Ponte Per and the Nineveh Provincial Council is one of the most exciting and in-depth peacebuilding support processes PATRIR's Department of Peace Operations (DPO) has been involved in to date. Through October and November the first events of the programme were held, with trainings with partners on community-based dialogue, mediation and reconciliation and hosting a 'multi-stakeholder strategic planning process' bringing together every local, national and international organisation working on peacebuilding and recovery in Nineveh, local government authorities, the UN and more. Training has been delivered on the ground by Kai Frithjof Brand-Jacobsen, Director of DPO. The engagement and dedication of partners and leadership by local authorities and civil society activists in and from Nineveh has contributed to the programme's incredible impact and success.

The Nineveh Provincial Council has now come on board as a full partner, and the UN has asked the partnership to plan for an extended, multi-year phase. In mid-December a Designing Peacebuilding Programmes 4-day process was held with 17 organizations and local authorities who designing peacebuilding interventions at the community level to improve relations between communities, create local peace committees, implement dialogue and mediation processes, and support reconciliation and trauma recovery and healing.

Also in October DPO Director Kai Brand-Jacobsen provided a training on peacebuilding and advocacy for the Alliance of Iraqi Minorities organized by AIM and Heartland Alliance International. The program assisted AIM members, legal experts and minority rights advocates across Iraq strengthen their capacity and advocacy campaigns to work for minority rights in Iraq.

Peace Operations at a glance

- Strengthening capabilities of key tribal, social, NGO and local authority leaders in Libya for peacebuilding and development of local / societal-based peacebuilding strategies;
- Significant contribution to the development of an Iraq Citizens' Peace Movement / Peace Process and the creation of Peace Houses in Erbil and Dohuk;
- Creation of the Strategic Peacebuilding Guide & Toolkit – a major milestone and contribution to the field to improve peacebuilding planning and interventions;

- Creation of the Beyond Violent Extremism Global Alliance and improving peacebuilding responses and approaches to addressing the drivers, causes, impacts, effects and dynamics of violent extremism (including state and non-state);
- Contribution of a peacebuilding vision and practice and strengthening ties with the field of peacebuilding at the World Peace Forum;
- Strengthened partnership with key peacebuilding allies: IAHV-PB, PAX, UPP, Rotary, Norwegian People's Aid (NPA)

Goals for 2016 and future strategies

- Consolidate development of the Beyond Violent Extremism Global Alliance, including creation of Arabic & English-language on-line platforms drawing together resources, toolkits, publications, best practices, stories and inspiration to support, enable, empower and inspire citizens and communities across the Middle East and North Africa and more broadly to transcend violent extremism and build violence and sectarian-free futures for their people / societies;
- Prioritize and develop further partnership and cooperation with PAX on development and implementation of Activist Academies on peacebuilding and nonviolence as well as supporting strategic planning in key country engagements;
- Prioritize and develop further partnership and cooperation with PAX, UPP, NPA, Al Mesalla, and the Citizens' Peace Movement / Peace Process Iraq for development of a long-term country program / engagement to support strengthening of local and national capacities for peacebuilding, healing and reconciliation in Iraq and transcending violent extremism and sectarian dynamics;
- To develop consolidated country programmes for Siria, Lebanon and Libya;
- To launch a global peacebuilding 'one stop' resource site for key resources, publications, hand-books and materials;
- To increase the scale of DPO on-request support to the UN, governments, and local, national and international organizations for peace operations.

In Pursuit of Peace: PATRIR in the Movies

The film was made over two years following peaceworkers in Iraq, Nepal, Sudan and elsewhere. PATRIR's work is also featured as the film follows DPO Director Kai Brand-Jacobsen in peacebuilding engagements in Nepal, Turkey and Iraq. The French language world premiere took place in Montreal in October and the English Language world premiere will be in April at the Toronto Documentary Film Festival, as well as in New York at UN Headquarters.

Strengthening the capacity of Egyptian youth and development education organizations and initiatives in assessing, planning, implementing and evaluating their educational efforts

The project Technical Assistance for Development and Civic Education in Egypt (4E) contributed to the expansion of sustainable initiatives in the field of development education and youth work in Egypt.

By reaching out to the Egyptian organizations and practitioners engaged in development education and youth work, the project aimed at assessing the capacity of local and national efforts in creating cumulative impact through their educational efforts, and developing a set of pilot training programs for strengthening constructive and sustainable impact generation.

Also it opened the possibility for multiplying knowledge among a wider target group that is linked to youth education in development education, leadership, social entrepreneurship, peace education and active citizenship

4E at a glance

- Generating demand-driven and evidence-based development education and youth work strategies and programs within the organizations involved in the project and their partners;
- Increasing the cumulative impact generation capacity of the target group through a better knowledge of past and existing actors and initiatives, understanding of the needs, challenges, achievements, impact and lessons learned in Egypt;
- Improving the integrated nature of youth work in Egypt through increased awareness, knowledge and skills on topics related to development education curricula;
- Facilitating exchange of best practices and lessons learned in development education and youth work between Egypt and Romania;
- Linking the representatives of the target group with their direct beneficiaries so to create trust and credibility of programs, and reach the widest segment of the population as possible.

Supporting multi-ethnic regions of Ukraine to improve the quality of education



PATRIR has engaged on an initiative to assess the context and later to pilot a multilingual education initiative in three Ukrainian regions: Odessa, Chernivtsi and Transcarpathia as part of the Crimea Policy Dialogue project.

Upon confirmation of interest in such an initiative by the Ministry of Education and Science of Ukraine. The objectives the initiative was intended to ensure capacities for quality education, to develop inter-community understanding, interaction and interdependence and to improve social cohesion and reduce tensions, with a first year focused on piloting and capacity building.

MLE at a glance

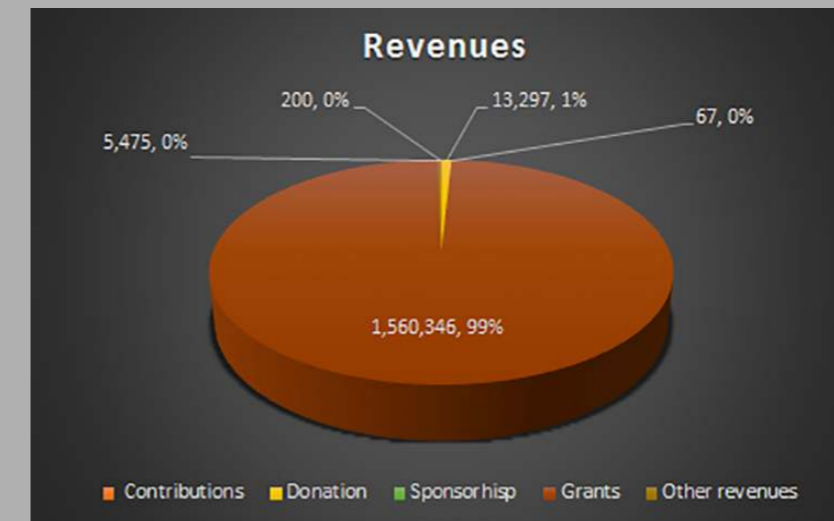
- Generated initial assessment document on the perceptions, needs and fears in the 3 regions regarding MLE
- Released a document with methodological recommendations for implementing a MLE program in Ukraine
- 30+ teachers and educators trained in MLE principles, methodological approaches and models
- Delivered technical equipment to the educational institutions to facilitate the multilingual teaching and learning processes and to increase interactivity during classes
- Distributed materials in several languages regarding supporting multilingualism at home and in school
- Covered ministerial decisions regarding MLE experiment for the upcoming 5 years and draft Law on Education including a provision regarding the ability of schools to opt for multilingual educational models
- Consultative meetings and events held in order to present the results and to identify the strategic directions and partnerships that will allow a comprehensive implementation of the MLE programme starting with 2016-2017 school year
- Documentary film capturing the experience of MLE implementation in Ukraine



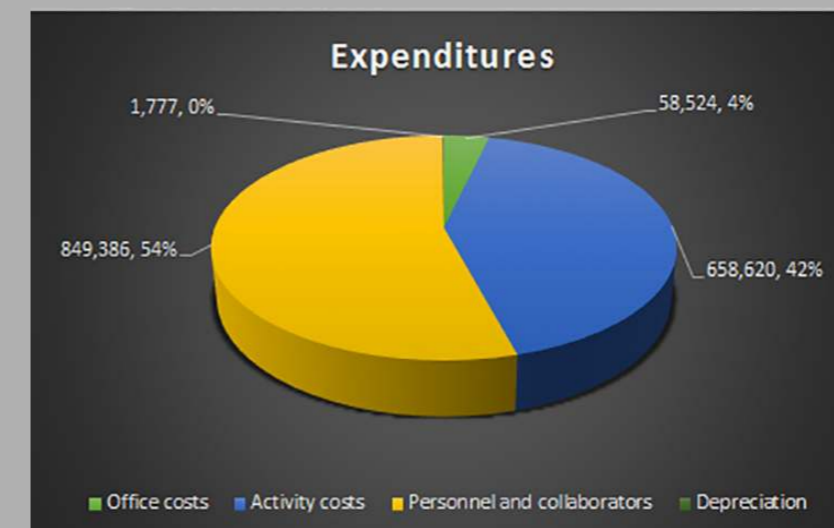

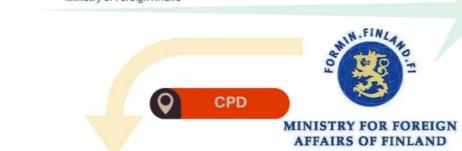
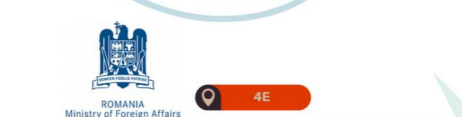
